From adopting the Curriculum and Credit Framework (CCF) to promoting interdisciplinary research and fostering character development, the college has undertaken a series of initiatives to enhance the quality and relevance of education.

### **Alignment with NEP Vision**

Vivekananda College, Thakurpukur, embraced the vision outlined in the National Education Policy (NEP) to provide high-quality education and nurture global citizens from the session 2023-2024.

### **Adoption of CCF**

Vivekananda College, Thakurpukur, aligns with the University of Calcutta's new Curriculum and Credit Framework (CCF), adopting the nomenclature "Major" for Honours and "Minor" for Electives. The CCF introduces innovative courses like Interdisciplinary Courses (IDC) and Common Value-Added Courses (CVAC).

### **Promoting Interdisciplinary Research and Academic Excellence Initiatives**

In line with the National Education Policy (NEP), the college organizes interdepartmental seminars and webinars to expose students to interdisciplinary research fields. and promoting holistic academic growth.

To foster academic excellence, the college conducts webinars, guest lectures, workshops, and study tours. Additionally, training, guidance, and placement activities are organized to enhance career opportunities for students.

### **Emphasis on Character-Building and Employability**

Recognizing the evolving landscape of education, the institution emphasizes characterbuilding, value impartation, and employability readiness through its curriculum.

### **Skill Development Initiatives**

NEP-aligned initiatives include skill development through add-on courses to enhance student employability.

The college encourages research activities through field projects, dissertations, and ICT-based teaching-learning methods. The Research Guidance Cell supports faculty in advancing research endeavors.

The institution emphasizes social welfare through NCC, NSS, and other cells, bodies, and departments, facilitating community engagement and service.

### **Faculty Development**

Faculty members stay updated on online/blended education modes through regular participation in seminars, workshops, and conferences, reflecting the institution's commitment to NEP's vision and adaptability to changing educational paradigms.

### **Curriculum Enhancement- Role of Academic Subcommittee**

Vivekananda College, Thakurpukur, has been instrumental in implementing the National Education Policy (NEP) through its Academic Subcommittee. The subcommittee, in collaboration with departmental heads, has facilitated the alignment with the Curriculum and Credit Framework (CCF) guidelines and ensured the seamless operation of academic activities.

Three pivotal meetings were convened by the Academic Sub-Committee to deliberate on the implementation of the CCF, adhering to the directives outlined in the University of Calcutta's CSRs. The university's admission regulations were formally communicated on 23.06.2023. During the meeting held on 27.06.2023, the subcommittee extensively discussed the admission rules and course structures of the 4-year and 3-year B.A./B.Sc./B.Com. degree courses in accordance with the University of Calcutta's guidelines. Furthermore, the subcommittee finalized the subject combinations to be offered by the college for various courses. The admission process for UG-level courses was efficiently conducted through a standalone online admission portal at the institutional level, consistent with past practices.

Subsequently, after commencing Semester I classes based on a provisional routine, the subcommittee reconvened on 18.08.2023 to endorse the new routine for the odd semesters of the academic session 2023-24. Amendments were made to the time slots for compulsory subjects, including AEC and CVACs, ensuring optimal resource utilization and the smooth operation of both CBCS and CCF courses.

Additionally, decisions were made regarding the introduction of Interdisciplinary Courses (IDC), structuring summer internships, and offering optional Common Value-Added Courses (CVAC). These proactive measures underscored the college's commitment to aligning with NEP's objectives and enhancing the quality of education for its students.

In preparation for the semester-end examinations, the subcommittee finalized examination regulations on 18.12.2023. During the third meeting held on 04.01.2024, examination rules for the 4-year and 3-year B.A./B.Sc./B.Com. degree courses were thoroughly discussed. Modalities for theory and practical examinations for IDC (both Honours and Multidisciplinary Course students) and SEC (for Multidisciplinary Course students) subjects

were meticulously finalized, including protocols for confidential work such as setting and moderation of question papers, printing, proofreading, etc.

### **Implementation of Internships and CVAC Courses**

Preliminary discussions were conducted regarding the modalities of the summer internship to be undertaken during Semester II of the 4-year/3-year courses under the CCF system, as notified by the university on 29.12. 2023. The college has outlined modalities guidelines for internships, exceeding 18 hours, which are compulsory for students in both three-year and four-year degree programs across Commerce, Humanities, and Science disciplines. These proposed guidelines have been submitted to the University of Calcutta by the Principal in Aug 2023 for official approval. Furthermore, a proposal has been developed and sent to the university for the introduction of Optional Value-Added Courses (CVAC) for Semester-2 students in the Undergraduate Programme (4-Year Hons. & Hons. with research and MDC), in accordance with the Curriculum & Credit Framework 2022.

Furthermore, faculty members engaged in extensive discussions on NEP principles, encompassing diversified curriculum and pedagogy, leveraging technology for innovative teaching, and fostering critical thinking and creativity. As an affiliate of the University of Calcutta, Vivekananda College integrates multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary courses into its academic programs, offering students a comprehensive array of electives since the 2023 session. Proposals for interdisciplinary curricula empower students to select from a diverse range of program options, promoting holistic academic growth. Embracing NEP guidelines, the college actively realigns its educational practices, exemplifying a proactive approach to educational enhancement.


### Workshop on CCF




### **Proposed Syllabi for Optional CVAC Courses**






